World War One Vigil Service 4th August 2014 at 7.30pm at Ormskirk Parish Church

Order of Service

The visual symbolism of light and darkness is a vital aspect of this night service. Four candles representing the four corners of the world are placed in a square visible to the gathered congregation. Two are extinguished at the end of each reading, and a fifth, large candle is brought in for the reading of the Gospel. At the end of the Gospel reading the fifth candle is placed in the centre of the four extinguished candles to remind us that in the light of Christ we are able to face the enclosing darkness.
